"Does reporting a child/family to 'social services' mean the child will be removed from their family immediately by social workers?"

FACT

"No. Sharing your concerns with a local authority does not mean a child will be automatically taken into care."

MYTH

"It's only child abuse if there's physical or sexual violence."

FACT

"No. Child abuse also includes emotional abuse and neglect. Many children and young people who suffer from abuse are likely to experience more than one type."

MYTH

"People will know it is me that reported."

FACT

"When you report to your local children's social care team you will be asked for your details and can discuss if you'd prefer your details were kept private."
