<u> Thursday 17th April – Year 1</u>

Year 1 enjoyed their Forest School session during Holy Week. To start the session children explored that area and found natural items that could fit in the palm of their hand. They then used these to create natural artwork. Next the children made their own bread dough using milk and flour before wrapping it round a stick to cook on an open fire. It was surprisingly tasty! The children also created crosses using clay. They rolled their clay into two snake shapes before pressing them together to make a cross. They were decorated using natural materials to leave impressions.



Thursday 3rd April 2025 - Year 3

Year 3 had a wonderful Forest School session linked to their science topic of forces. We started off by completing a treasure hunt around the forest school area trying to find different natural resources which fit on our grid. We then completed three activities linked to our topic: we made catapults using lollipop sticks and elastic bands, we created a pulley system using carabiner clps and rope to create a lever to lift logs off the ground and finally we completed an investigation to see how long it took gravity to act on certain objects when they were falling from a height. It was a lovely morning made even better by the beautiful weather, we were so grateful to have had!

Thursday 20th March 2025 - EYFS

EYFS enjoyed a fantastic Forest School session in the sunshine today! We started off by creating minibeast movements before making minibeast models using clay and natural materials. We enjoyed making lots of ladybirds and snails. We also built dens using wooden poles and material, developing our motor skills by hammering them in to the ground! We looked for minibeasts and signs of spring in our sensory garden, taking photos using our iPads, and we loved using the rope swing. We finished off by toasting marshmallows around the campfire and enjoyed our delicious hot chocolate too.





Thursday 13th March - Year 5

Year 5 had a brilliant time during their Forest School session in Rivacre Valley. During the morning, they used aerial maps to locate different areas in their local nature reserve, before using IPads to identify flora and fauna that they spotted throughout the session. The children also used their IPads to capture any signs of spring that they could see to create an artistic collage using zooms and filters. To end the session, the children came back to school for a campfire in the Forest School area and toasted some marshmallows.



<u>Thursday 6th March - Year 6</u>

Year 6 thoroughly enjoyed their World Book Day-themed forest school with Jon. Our session also linked with our upcoming transition to secondary school as we were told a story about a bird who had left his friends behind and needed to survive in a new place. We used natural resources to represent the story and to create small birds to represent the characters. This was a great opportunity for us to use all of our forest school skills to create something memorable and beautiful.



<u>Thursday 27th February - Year 1</u>

The sun was shining brightly for our Forest School session and we had such an amazing time! We started by matching natural objects to nature cards. After that we made a spinning top toy by sawing a log slice and decorating it. We also learned how to tie a knot to make a log dog. Some of our log dogs were very cheeky and noisy! Finally, we set fire to paper houses to show how the Great Fire of London spread so easily.



<u>Thursday 13th February - Year 2</u>

The cold morning didn't stop us being creative outside today in Forest School. Year 2 really enjoyed using natural materials and the outdoor environment to create individual and group pieces of art. We used clay and items found in the nature area to create faces and we were inspired by the work of Andy Goldsworthy to create some beautiful patterns. To finish the session we had a fire and toasted marshmallows. We had lots of fun and look forward to our next session!



<u> Thursday 6th February - Year 3</u>

The misty fog and cold weather didn't hold us back today! Year 3 had a wonderful Forest School session with Jon, jam packed full of activities all linked to our topic of Roman Britain. We began by playing some trust-building games, before moving onto recapping a knot we would need for the session, squarelashing. Today our activities included: using hammer and nails to make Roman numerals, using a bow-saw to slice logs of wood to create Roman coins and using our square-lash knots to create a replica of an aqueduct. The children showed great perseverance in the cold conditions and we were lucky enough to finish off our session with a fire and toasted marshmallow.



<u>Thursday 24th January - Year 5</u>

The wet weather was no match for our zestful Year 5 during today's wet Forest School session. We layered up and got outside for a fantastic morning learning all about the lives and beliefs of the Native American people. We worked on several different activities, including wood cutting and fire lighting, tipi making and shaping willow to create dreamcatachers for our latest Design Technology project. Back in class, we spent the afternoon weaving wool around our willow frames and decoraring our dreamcatchers with feathers, leaves and pine cones in an authentic way, similar to the designs used by the early Native American tribes.



Thursday 16th January 2025 - Year 6

Today, Year 6 took part in some Maya-inspired activities to help us with our new topic. We made Maya inspired pyramids using natural resources. We also used our knowledge of lighting fires so we can safely make our own using strikers to create a flame and sticks to keep the fire burning. A further activity that we all took part in was where we cut our own wooden discs to make our own Maya jewellery.
