St Mary of the Angels Catholic Primary School is passionate about creating sporting opportunities for our pupils.

To ensure we can offer the best sporting opportunities to children, we utilise sports premium. The primary PE and Sport premium was introduced in March 2013 to improve the provision of physical education and school sport in primary schools across England. The funding is allocated directly to primary schools and may only be spent on improving the provision of PE and sport in schools. Schools have the freedom to choose how they spend their sports premium but must report on their use of this money yearly.

| We employed a specialist dance teacher to provide dance teaching this year and act as CPD for teachers.                            | Teachers increased their own subject knowledge and had the opportunity to team-teach with the dance teacher. Staff appreciated the CPD to increase their confidence in dance delivery. Pupils' engagement and enjoyment in dance increased – evident through pupil voice. | We want this to be a sustainable part of the PE curriculum. Due to pupil and staff feedback, we are going to employ the dance teacher for another year to increase the children's exposure to different styles of dance. |
| We employed a specialist outdoor learning teacher to deliver Forest School sessions and outdoor activities including orienteering. | Pupils exposure to understanding LOTC has increased. Teachers can observe good practice and use these opportunities to plan for cross-curricular learning. Another benefit to this outdoor learning is it supports mental health and well-being.                          | We will continue to invest in the Forest School provision next year – this is something all classes benefit from, for a morning slot, 5 times a year.   |

Teachers have been able to observe 6 hours of dance, in the same genre (e.g. Line in Year 4, Country in Year 5, Musical Theatre in Year 3).                                   |
| School have achieved Sports Mark Gold for the third year running, due to their high engagement with the local sports competitions and events. School bought a new sports kit for children to wear at these events. | Children are being given opportunities for competition in different sports, and chance to represent their school. The new school kit creates a sense of belonging and the children feel proud to be representing their school. Participation can open up pathways for children into different sporting clubs. | Teacher and pupil feedback has been very positive about our engagement with SSP events this year. | What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?        | 94%    | This cohort had more difficulty accessing swimming during their childhood due to the COVID-19 pandemic, waiting lists were then very long after swimming pools re-opened. |
| What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]? | 94%    | Many pupils are confident using a range of strokes.  Some pupils struggled to perform more than one stroke.   |

| What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?   | 97% | All pupils took part in the water-safety lesson during swimming. All pupils have also benefitted from water-safety assemblies each year during their time in school, delivered by National Waterway Museum and RNLI.   |

Have you done this? | No  | Part of the SSP membership includes some children in Year 6 being given the opportunity to attend top-up swimming sessions for a week.  We took this offer up and sent some of our children, all of whom successfully could swim 25m by the end of the top-up lessons. |
| Have you provided CPD to improve the knowledge and confidence of staff to be able to teach swimming and water safety?   | Yes | Two members of staff are fully trained to teach swimming to our children. We benefit from an extra group being taught by school staff during our swimming lessons.   |
